ANSWER: (Ashton Court, Leigh Court)

How much money did Philip John Miles claim in 1814 according to slave compensation records? (2 points)

ANSWER: (£36,000 at the time, which translates to £3,000,000 now)
One point is awarded for 36k, and one point is awarded for £3 million

Which family owned Ashton Court until the 1950's? How might they have made their money? (2 points)

ANSWER: The Smyth family – records suggest that they were involved in the slave trade before Bristol became an important port.

(The World Wars Answers)

Between 1942 and 1945, how many US servicemen were stationed in Britain? (1 point)

ANSWER - approximately 3 million

Many African-American soldiers were based in Bristol – name 3 locations they were positioned at (3 points)

ANSWER: There were barracks in Bedminster, Brislington, Henleaze, Shirehampton and the Muller Orphanage at Ashley Down – one point awarded for each location.

Why was there tension between white soldiers and Black soldiers in the US army? (3 points)

ANSWER : The US army at this time was racially segregated; American soldiers were governed by American law on British Soil (one point). The US Army policed their troops and instilled the segregated attitude that characterised America at the time - the Jim Crow laws (2 points) – this racist segregation created constant tension between Black and White soldiers (3 points), with this tension often getting violent).

(The World Wars (Answers))

What happened in Old Market in 1942? (2 points)

ANSWER:

In December 1942 there was a series of fights and stabbings in the Old Market area of Bristol (one point). This was due to southern American soldiers growing tired of seeing black soldiers with local women that lead to fights and riots (one point).

What happened on Park Street and Georges Street on July 15th, 1944? (2 points)

The Park Street Riot (one point). The Park Street Riot occurred in Park Street and George Street, on 15 July 1944 when many black US servicemen (GIs) refused to return to their camps after US military policemen (MPs) arrived to end a minor scuffle (one point).
